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From the Principal



A Year to Celebrate

One of the many privileges of being Principal at St Bede's College is the opportunity to observe our students, their families and our staff interact as part of our community. The extraordinary events and opportunities throughout the year allow us to unite in important relationships firmly centred on our students.

It is also an honour to witness the special relationship between our students and their parents. For many families, the hugs and kisses that abound in the junior years are still seen at drop-off in the senior years. For others, this display of affection can 'go missing' during the adolescent years, but often makes a welcome return at Graduation.

Just as boys develop differently in a physical sense, they also do emotionally and socially. It is all a very normal - and sometimes frustrating – part of the emotional growth our young people experience or experiment with, as they navigate through adolescence and adulthood. It also highlights for all of us to examine how we seek to help these individuals grow.

For deeper insight, I look to words by celebrated Australian author Tim Winton, who examines the pressures young men face in their emotional development. Winton suggests that social constructs and false media norms may force boys to hide their emotions. Winton's passion for surfing allows him to bear witness to conversation amongst boys, spanning from "stuff that wants to make him hug them, stuff that wants to make him cry and sadly, stuff that makes me ashamed to be a male."

Winton surmises that boys are simply experimenting with their emotional growth, or "rehearsing their masculinity". The cues and feedback they receive after each behaviour and interaction determines the behaviour they will most likely adopt, and the emotions they may openly share in the future.

Here at our College, we look to complement parents in forming and supporting these individuals, who will become gentlemen for others. A statement from De La Salle Brother and former St Bede's College Principal, Br Gary Coyte, resonated with me. "At St Bede's we aim to produce graduates who will go on to become good fathers and good husbands."

It's why our curriculum includes programs that focus on recognising and understanding emotions, building respectful relationships, valuing true friendships, and respecting and celebrating the role of women. Increasingly, a focus on mental health, resilience, leadership and general wellbeing is embedded at our College via *The Resilience Project* and *The Rite Journey*. Our student leaders constantly provide me with cues as to how their peers are feeling, and what challenges are uppermost in their minds.

As a partnership of family and the College, we aspire for each individual student to be their best and to live in a manner that reflects our shared Catholic and Lasallian values. We hope for them a future where they continue to grow, embracing inclusivity, compassion, deep respect and awareness of the other.

Our vision is to help shape young people who are strong yet gentle, determined yet considerate, focussed yet compassionate, proud yet humble, independent yet inclusive, driven yet inquisitive, and upright, yet loving. Confident people who approach the future with zeal!

Archbishop Oscar Romero once said, "Good education must result in young people being not only gifted and accomplished but also wise and holy. This is what we are about: We plant seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold the future promise."

This year's College theme *Together We Serve: Locally* and *Globally* is inspired by our Lasallian identity and its characteristics of Faith, Service, and Community. We have a proud tradition of serving together to make a difference to those who are in need across the world. \$88,000 on Mission Action Day (MAD). This brought awareness of and raised funds for the De La Salle Mission schools in Balgo WA, Papua New Guinea, Pakistan and other Lasallian communities in need.

2023 marked a return of our *Indigenous Immersion* to the Lasallian school in Balgo, Western Australia. Our group of students and staff served the community at Luurnpa Catholic School in the Wirrimanu Community of Balgo Hills. Our participants worked with Luurnpa's students in the classroom and developing after-school programs. The daily journals kept by our students made for interesting reading, not to mention their pride in making a meaningful contribution.

It was a joy to see community service continue in other inclusive ways across our College, with *The Push-Up Challenge*, bringing together 704 students, staff and families to raise \$8,700 for *Movember* and men's mental health.

In Term 1, we were honoured to receive three Lasallian Leaders at St Bede's College for a Pastoral visit made by:

- Br Armin Luistro, newly elected 28th Superior General of the De La Salle Brothers and the Lasallian Institute,
- Br Chris Patino, newly elected General Councillor of the De La Salle Brothers and the Lasallian Institute, and
- Br Tim Peter, Provincial of the De La Salle Brothers of Australia, New Zealand, Pakistan and Papua New Guinea.

The Brothers spent time in classrooms, met with student delegations for Q&A, shared morning tea with staff, and participated in the simulcast of the Holy Week Liturgy from our College Chapel. Br Armin encouraged us all to continue to be people of faith, service and community. The Brothers were delighted to meet our students and witness the diverse learning experiences at our College.



On Friday 12 May, representatives from St Bede's College and students from Benilde House had the privilege of attending the Reef Renaming Ceremony at Aspendale beach, in memory of student, Rhys Gillard who passed away in 2021.

'*Rhys Reef*' is a fitting tribute to a fine young man, who was taken from us far too soon. We also remembered Rhys in a Benilde House prayer service to acknowledge the 2-year anniversary on May 13 of Rhys' passing. It was lovely to have the Gillard family in attendance – Anna, David, Austen and Tom.

St Bede's College Board

The Annual General Meeting of the St Bede's College Board took place in May and we were pleased to welcome new Members representing the Chair of Members, Br Peter Ryan. There have been some changes to the structure under which the College operates as part of the De La Salle District Council (which covers Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and Pakistan). Previously, the sole trustee of the school was the Brother Visitor, the term given to the head of the District.

This has been broadened to a panel of four Members; two Brothers and two Lay People, to support a closer and more collaborative working relationship with the trustees. These changes do not impact the mission or operation of our College.

The Board welcomed three new Members in 2023; Rebecca Kotow, Tim Honey and John Csorgo. Each brings significant experience and is warmly welcomed. I am grateful for the time and expertise the Board provides, with its particular focus on the quality governance of our College.









Annual Action Plan 2023

We are pleased to share some of the very important achievements as part of our Annual Action Plan for 2023.

Student Wellbeing

- Introduction of the *Pastoral Period*, Years 7 to 12.
- The Resilience Project and The Rite Journey program introduced for Year 9 students.
- Planning for the reintroduction of an international travel opportunity for students.
- The appointment of two Integral Ecological Leaders to focus on local and global sustainability.

Education in Faith

- Indigenous Immersion community service trip to Balgo, Western Australia.
- The Rite Journey program introduced as part of the Year 9 Religious Education curriculum.

Learning and Teaching

- Continuous reporting accessible to parents via Parent Access Module (PAM).
- Staff professional learning across formative assessment as an increasing feature of all classrooms. Formative assessment provides students with feedback along the journey, rather than at test or assessment task completion. It also gives teachers feedback of how their message is received.

- Development of a data system and professional development for staff on system use to improve student learning outcomes.
- Appointment of a Gifted and Talented Coordinator, growth coaching for students and staff involved in the mentor program and expansion of the mentor program for Year 12 students. Greater provision for students across the year levels to access challenge opportunities.

Learning and Management

- Following consultation of the College Board, parents, students and staff, a Strategic Plan for 2024-2027 was approved.
- Tendering to engage an architect to assist and advise in the development of a new College Masterplan.
- All Deputy Principals undertook an external formative performance review.
- College successfully complete a VRQA Statutory Compliance check.
- Board Chairperson, Chair of the Risk and Compliance Committee, Business Manager and Principal attended two-day CECV Board Governance Training. This focused on the role of the Board, Strategic Planning, Risk and Financial Reporting.

From the Chair of the Board

This year has seen some relatively smooth sailing after the events that March 2020 and beyond brought to the world of education. 2023 has provided a more stable platform for our College to focus on its mission of educating students in an inclusive, connected, globally aware and values-driven environment.

The College theme for 2023 has been '*Together we serve*: locally and globally', and while the local aspect of the theme seems straightforward, how the College operates in a global context is an interesting and challenging question, especially amid turbulent times in parts of the world.

In February, the College was privileged to host a presentation by Br. Peter Bray, Vice Chancellor of Bethlehem University. Bethlehem is a Catholic university in the West Bank providing tertiary education to all Palestinians. Br. Peter painted a vivid picture of how challenging it is for the University's students to get to school. Such things may seem remote to the day-to-day lives of our students, but we should remember that in their digital lives they are far less constrained by geography than previous generations.

Global citizenship is a key tenet of the Council of International Schools (CIS), of which St Bede's College is one of few accredited member schools in Australia, and we expect this will be a valuable guiding light in how we 'serve globally' over the coming years. On a more tangible level, our College is reaching out into the world again, with several trips planned to Europe and Asia for language and community purposes.

The global context has also been a factor in another matter occupying the Board this year. Like most families and organisations, we have spent significant time and energy on how to best manage increasing costs. With the new Enterprise Agreement that came into effect this year, it has significantly added to staffing overheads, both in term of salaries and the number of teachers required. Other expenses such as insurance and utilities have also increased markedly. In something of a 'double whammy', the College's Direct Measure of Income (DMI) rating also increased, reducing slightly the Government funding received.

Two of our guiding principles are to ensure the College can provide excellent service whilst keeping fee increases to a minimum, and also providing support to those families that need it. The Board recognises the fantastic work performed in this area by Business Manager Dominic Langdon and his team. Dom also functions as Company Secretary in his 'spare' time.

Governance has also been a key theme for 2023. Under our new 2022 constitution, the College is required to convene an Annual General Meeting, and we held the first of these in May this year in conjunction with the company members.

We are grateful for the support provided by these members, led by the Lasallian Brother Visitor Br Tim Peter, with Br Peter Ryan, Maria Pearson and our liaison member Mary Fitz-Gerald. We look forward to working closely with the members across important school matters in 2024.

I would also like to thank the Board's Risk Committee led by John Csorgo, who has done a sterling job of finalising our risk framework. Compliance and Risk Management are a growing burden for both the College and its volunteer board, and the framework provides an excellent foundation for handling risk in a methodical and transparent way. "Two of our guiding principles are to ensure the school can provide excellent service whilst keeping fee increases to a minimum, and also providing support to those families that need it."

Thanks also to Marg Burge for leading the Board Composition Committee and to Sal Algeri and the Finance Committee for working closely with Dom to ensure the College continues to be in strong and stable financial position.

My gratitude goes to all other Directors and committee members Tim Honey, Paula Wilton, Karen Chandler, Bec Kotow and Tony Hirst, all of whom are so gracious with their time and expertise.

Thank you as well to Deb Frizza and the Senior Leadership Team for supporting the Board, and also to those in the Parents and Friends, Old Collegians, the canteen and other areas where volunteers make such an important contribution to the life of the school. Lastly a special thank you to Jo Hynes without whom we could not function.

With several important initiatives planned in 2024, we look forward to an exciting year for St Bede's College.



Seasons For Growth program

The program is based on research that highlights the importance of social support and the need to practise new skills to cope effectively with change and loss. It focuses on issues such as self-esteem, managing feelings, problem-solving, decision-making, effective communication and support networks.

In our second year of this program, we've journeyed together in the knowledge that we are never alone as we experience the various 'seasons of life'. When we share these experiences with each other, we discover a sense of comfort and understanding. It is heartening to witness the brotherly support and respect that our students offer to one another.

Lasallian Service program

A number of students have taken the initiative to volunteer in their local communities and families during the year. We congratulate them for their determination and commitment to actively involve themselves in outreach to the community, their families and our College community.

This year, we placed third in Victoria, and eighth nationally for community engagement – completing over 662,000 push ups collectively. I couldn't be any prouder of this collaborative effort.

The way that The Push Up Challenge has been embraced by everybody at the College epitomises the Beda Spirit. Pushing your mates to be better versions of themselves, the feelings of pride and the celebrations of success, or the vulnerable conversations with a trusted teacher or peer.

It's my hope that the energy, passion and vulnerability that exists over the 26 days of this challenge continues to grow and integrate itself into the essence of College life reassuring each and every student that a blue blazer truly does have their back every step of the way.



Wellbeing is an intrinsic and essential component of our College's strategic framework to help each student achieve their personal best.

As part of our whole-school commitment to Student Wellbeing, St Bede's College is pleased to bring a diversity of programs, initiatives, and professional counselling to all students. These aim to build and strengthen resilience, develop a strong sense of self and support a positive outlook on life.

Student Wellbeing is integrated into the timetable, ensuring that every learner has regular scheduled time to access helpful resources, take part in group discussions, attend counselling, or gain valuable insight from a special guest speaker.

This year, our Student Wellbeing programs have included:

- **One-on-One Counselling** ranges from a one-off check-in to long-term regular sessions.
- **Group Counselling** offers a safe space for all attendees, providing a good sounding board, where students can connect with others facing similar experiences.
- **Therapy Dog** counselling sessions may be co-hosted by our divine therapy dog, Remi.
- Seasons for Growth program that helps students dealing with grief, loss and change.
- Drug Alcohol Research and Training Australia Senior Students sessions with expert Paul Dillon.
- **One Beda** Student Diversity and Inclusion in Action group, who drive safe spaces, student voice and support for initiatives including *Wear It Purple Day* and *R U OK? Day.*
- The Resilience Project regular student resources to practice Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness.
- Games Cove weekly lunchtime games space for students in Years 7 to 9.
- **Dr Jodi Richardson** seminars on anxiety and resilience for students.

Growth of the Wellbeing Team

The Wellbeing Team is supporting around 400 students with professional counselling sessions.

It is particularly heartening to see so many students refer their friend or family member for counselling, based on their personal positive experiences with the service provided.

Thanks to the brilliant efforts of our students, we exceeded this and raised almost \$88,000. All funds support our Lasallian brothers and sisters, so they have a future filled with opportunities and possibilities.

This was achieved by students completing a 10-kilometre walk along the beach trail.

The day featured performances by one of the student bands, a whole College prayer service, a hot dog lunch, carnival rides, performances and other activities planned by our Student Leadership Team. Funds raised on previous MAD events have contributed significantly to these communities, and have enabled the building of houses, classrooms, sanitation amenities, health facilities and IT infrastructure. Specific projects in which St Bede's College have been involved include:

- La Salle Technical College in Hohola, Papua New Guinea

 contributed funds to offer academic opportunities and technical and vocational training to students who are not able to gain entry into a government secondary school.
- La Salle High School, Khushpur, Pakistan water safety and shelter project.
- St Solomon's WASH project, Pakistan construction of new washrooms for female students and new drinking water and filtration system.

Celebrating our College Masses



Each year, students can take part in a number of faith formation experiences, Masses, programs and resources for our College Community to nurture and enrich our Catholic and Lasallian identity.

It was wonderful to welcome so many of our students along with their families to our Opening College Year Mass. Bishop Tony Ireland served as Principal Celebrant, accompanied by four of our Chaplains: Fr Peter Matheson, Fr Alan Fox, Fr Denis Stanley and Fr Ignatius Tan. Our College Student Leaders were anointed and commissioned by Bishop Tony at the end of the Mass.

Later in Term 1, we attended the Catholic Education Week Mass for Schools along with 334 Catholic schools in the Archdiocese to celebrate our distinctive identity, our achievements, and the role our College plays within our parish and local communities.

To honour St John Baptist de La Salle and his great legacy, we celebrated Founder's Day Mass in May, where more than two-thousand students and staff united. To reflect the multicultural nature of Lasallian schools across 80 countries, many readings and prayers were shared in English, French, Polish, and student-led Prayers of the Faithful in Indonesian, Italian, Greek, Tagalog, Ukranian and Russian.

To mark the occasion of the Virgin Mary's ascent to heaven, we celebrated the Assumption Day Mass on August 15. The readings, prayers and homily on this Holy Day remind us that Mary's life of faith, service and trust in God is an inspiration for all. Our own Lasallian Youth Leaders were presented with badges in recognition of their commitment to our values of faith, service and community.

Lasallian Connections

Our connection to local and global Lasallian Community is an enriching, educational and enjoyable part of our College identity. It was our pleasure to host Brother Peter Bray, a De La Salle brother and the 8th Vice Chancellor of Bethlehem University in Palestine.

In an evening address to the College, Br Peter shared with us the story of Bethlehem University – the first of its kind in the West Bank providing higher education to the Palestinian people, whether Christian or Muslim. He spoke of the history of Palestine and Israel, and gave real-life perspective to the experiences of the University's students, staff, faculty members and Brothers. The evening raised nearly \$2000 in donations to Bethlehem University, to make a great impact on a young Palestinian student.

A Pastoral visit from three newly elected Lasallian Leaders saw three Brothers meet with our student delegations, classroom visits and witnessed the diverse learning our students get to experience. We were pleased to welcome Br Armin Luistro - newly elected 28th Superior General of the De La Salle Brothers and the Lasallian Institute; Br Chris Patino, newly elected General Councillor of the De La Salle Brothers and the Lasallian Institute, and Br Tim Peter, Provincial of the De La Salle Brothers of Australia, New Zealand, Pakistan and Papua New Guinea.

Our stay in Broome consisted of beach swims, long beach treks, a camel ride, museum visits, and a Yarning Ceremony at St Mary's College where we heard from First Nations People, Bridget and Aloysius. They shared stories about their upbringing and their personal experiences with the Stolen Generations.

Brother Rick Gaffney met us in Broome to help us make the make our 14-hour drive to Balgo. Along the journey we made really strong connections with each other through jokes, laughs and food. On the drive, I learnt how beautiful and vast the Australian Kimberly landscape is.

Upon arriving in Balgo, we were greeted and welcomed by the Principal, Ms Rachel Smith. We stayed at Luurnpa Catholic Primary School in spare classrooms.

We met and interacted with the Elders, and joined children on a field trip to a sacred site. During our stay, we noticed a large increase in school attendance, which resulted in more learning and the intellectual growth in the students; this strengthens their potential in the future.

One evening, we went out to 'The Pound'; under the stars, in the open sky. We indulged in some homemade damper, kangaroo tail and frog. It was at this point we began to realise that Balgo's Indigenous peoples - who in comparison to all of us - live in such poverty, and are yet so happy with what they have. It just makes you think to yourself, how much do I really need?

Balgo is such a brilliant community, shown through their love and passion for their culture, their warm welcome for visitors and their enormous love for Australian Rules Football.

The experiences and interactions we had with the students collectively broadened our perspective - not only on how much we impacted these children's lives - but how much they impacted ours. Our trip was enormously fulfilling and will stay with us forever."

Indigenous Immersion Experience Saltbush, Balnarring Victoria



Teaching Reflection

In July, a group of our Year 10 students were fortunate to take part in an Indigenous Immersion camp at 'Saltbush' in Balnarring.

In conjunction with students from Kilbreda College, the group participated in many activities ranging from weeding, planting native species, painting, baking damper, eating Indigenous plants and bulbs and learnt more about Indigenous culture.

Our leader of these activities was Adam Magennis, a Bunurong artist who frequently works with our College Community. Each day began with a smoking ceremony where native plants including wattle, manna gum and cherry ballart were used. Adam explained to the group the significance and meaning of each and the order of which these plant species are used in ceremony.

During the day the group participated in activities and walks on country and in the evening gather for movies including the eye-opening documentary, "In My Blood It Runs". A highlight of the Immersion experience for myself, was the guided tour of the bush, where plants were identified that could be used for cooking, medicinal or practical purposes.

This was a beautiful and respectful experience and I am grateful to Adam, the Kilbreda staff who attended and the 19 students who were truly immersed and moved.

My personal favourites were learning about the numerous bush medicines that were used as ancient remedies from Shaun who was very passionate about his craft. It was also great to perform firestick farming, maintaining and transporting a campfire to control burn all the dried arasses.

Besides the activities, I found this camp an invaluable retreat from the overstimulation of the modern world. The escape into the natural scenery, away from the urban environment and technology was refreshing. Before this camp, I used to be quite ignorant of Indigenous culture, but this experience has made me view the practices of the Aboriginal peoples as simple, yet so purposeful. Unlike the Western World, they didn't want much and fulfilled their lives with a communal and spiritual connection to the country. It truly made me rethink what I value in my life.

Finally, this was a great opportunity to spend time with friends back in the cabins and even make new ones. I had numerous profound conversations and laughs during this experience that I will remember for a lifetime. I also want to thank Ms Patterson-Zigouras for going to the extra effort just to make my birthday so special

Teaching Reflection

The Careers Department is here to inform and support students to make decisions about their future pathways and careers.

From study skills, subject selection for VCE and Vocational Major, scholarships, to choosing a university or TAFE, arranging work placements and apprenticeships, or advice on gap years and volunteering, we help each student to explore and identify their passions, and work towards their career goals.

Part of this journey is encouraging career conversations at home, giving our students the opportunity to immerse themselves in tertiary environments, and exploring workplace trends so they are armed with valuable skills and relevant knowledge.

Central to this is remaining focussed on the careers of the future, which prioritise transferable enterprise skills for a modern workforce, such as Digital Literacy, Creativity, Problem Solving and Presentation Skills.

Whatever the challenge or opportunity that lies ahead, our students have a dedicated careers resource and wealth of information at the ready.

VCE & Careers Expo

Year 10 is a significant time in the lives of students as they enter the final stages of their secondary schooling. Decision-making for the future, careers, tertiary courses and subject selection become a key focus for students and their supportive families and teachers.

The students attended the Melbourne VCE and Careers Expo, Australia's most comprehensive and exciting careers event. This expo encompasses all career opportunities from employment to education and training in the trades, corporate and professional sectors.

Students were also able to attend seminars about VCE subjects, subject selection advice, tertiary courses, career and employment opportunities, study advice and gap years.

Morrisby Career Profiling

Our Year 10 students created a Morrisby Profile to assist with their future careers and subject selections.

Morrisby is an online careers tool, based on psychometric assessments, which can help and inspire students to explore different career and education options and get a feel for the opportunities available to them. The interactive careers and education planning tools offer personalised advice, helping students to choose options and make informed decisions about study pathways and career opportunities.

Students were able to see their assessment results and learn information about potential careers. Parents then could take part in a webinar with a Morrisby Career Analyst, and students had a follow-up feedback session with Morrisby Career Counsellors.

Tertiary Immersion Experience

Our Year 10 cohort had the opportunity to experience a day at their preferred place of higher education, from leading universities across Melbourne such as Monash, Melbourne, Swinburne, ACU and Deakin, RMIT and Holmesglen TAFE.

Through hands-on workshops, presentations and tours, students had many mind-opening experiences to the diversity of career pathway options available to them.

Teaching Reflection

This year, our College embarked upon a new endeavour to support the environmental sustainability of the places we learn, live and play. Our Integral Ecology program brings an embedded focus to our daily lives and how we use, reuse, recycle and repurpose enables us to have cleaner, clearer, happier spaces and a brighter future for years and generations to come.

Our Integral Ecology program is in line with Pope Francis' 2015 encyclical (Pope's letter) Laudato Si'. This letter was animated by St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of those who promote ecology, and from whom the Pope takes his name. Pope Francis draws attention to the spiritual basis for integral ecology here:

"If we approach nature and the environment without this openness to awe and wonder, if we no longer speak the language of fraternity and beauty in our relationship with the world, our attitude will be that of masters, consumers, ruthless exploiters, unable to set limits on their immediate needs. By contrast, if we feel intimately united with all that exists, then sobriety and care will well up spontaneously" (§11).

If we want to change the world, we must begin at home and at school. By adopting positive practices in these places, and applying critical thinking as to the impact our very efficient Western lifestyles have on our environments, we can make a difference to reducing waste and maximising our guality of life.

We've put this into practice at our College with more recycling bins and signs, encouraged the adoption of reusable plastics in student lunches, our cafés and canteens. Composting in the staff kitchen enriches the College garden beds, and feeds the worms we have in our larger compost bins.

One of our first initiatives of our Integral Ecology Program was to appoint Year 12 Ecological Leaders, and to invite students into our environmental sustainability journey. From 2024, students will have the opportunity to take on formal leadership positions for environmental sustainability, aligning with our commitment to tackling this issue.

We're blessed to have many students studying Environmental Science at the College, who are acutely attuned to the plight of our natural environments due to growing human impact upon our finite and delicate environment. We look forward to seeing what positive change they and our leaders can create for our College and Community environments.

It tests your understanding of forms of the English language and creates an inclusive work environment as you and your peers work through the historical language used."

Akin to a humanities subject, with very subtle resemblances to sciences such as Biology and Psychology, English Language follows more how language is used today and the reasoning behind it. Where regular English typically involves analysis of classic novels, English Language is a much more modern approach, we examine the 'why' and 'how' English Language is used in the real world and the journey it has taken to get where it is today.

Aspects of each English Language unit are relevant throughout the whole course, even into Year 12 – making, in my opinion, for a much more thorough learning experience."

Teaching Reflection

Our Geography students across Years 7 to 12 learnt more about our beautiful earth and the impact that changing conditions have on it.

Fieldwork is an important aspect of studying Geography as it allows us to better understand the areas we are researching and collect valuable data. We held various excursions in local areas, to Kinglake, and along the coastline of Port Phillip Bay from Mentone to Phillip Island.

Year 7 Students had the opportunity to conduct some fieldwork in their local areas of Mentone and Bentleigh East. They collected data on liveability features such as pollution, access to facilities and types of housing to decide what they thought the positives and negatives of the area were. They then made some excellent suggestions about how we can make improvements to the local areas.

As part of their study of coastal landscapes, Year 8 students headed to Mentone beach. They analysed coastal erosion and longshore drift, as well as the impact humans are having on our beautiful bay through pollution and misuse of resources. They then developed a report where they suggested some ways we can better protect our bay.

By exploring the concepts of liveability, natural recovery after bushfires, students can better understand the influence and impact we have as humans on the world around us. The more we can learn and discover, the more positive changes we can all make to protect our natural environments and resources.


Fieldwork – Phillip Island

They explored the land use change of the Summerland Peninsula, and how residential land developed in 1927 was removed by 2010 and converted to a nature reserve. Digital Technologies



Teaching Reflection

At the core of Digital Technologies here at our College is problem-based learning, which serves as a means to foster critical and creative thinking while actively engaging our students in the learning process.

As our students investigate and explore solutions to problems using technology, they acquire an understanding of the key skills and concepts integral to their learning.

Our Digital Technology students are supported in problembased learning activities by progressing through four specific stages or steps when solving problems. We refer to this approach as the Problem Solving Methodology (PSM), which draws its foundation from an engineering design process, encompassing the stages of analysis, design, development, and evaluation.

We've enjoyed a dynamic year of creative problem solving, through robotics, data analytics and exciting student leadership programs such as eLeaders, and popular STEM Competition, F1 in Schools,

Student Highlights

"In Year 9 STEM, we've learnt about physical computing and digital systems. Our first topic was all about robotics. We were tasked to program a LEGO EV3 Mindstorms robot to solve a problem that affects you or someone else every day.

In our group we designed a security robot called the Guardian Bot, which is designed to help with home security. The robot has been coded to travel along a set route, so that if anything interrupts this route it will be sensed by the ultrasonic sensor and an alarm will sound. The robot gets louder and starts to spin, warning the owners of the robot of any disturbances.

To achieve this goal, we have had to analyse the problem, break it down and decide how we are going to solve it. We had to consider the constraints or limitations when designing our software and hardware. We also needed to consider what was essential and what we could add to increase the engagement factor for users. Finally, other than the actual design and development process, we have had to create a set of criteria, which we will use to assess our final product.

Overall, it has been a great experience with many useful lessons which we can take into our future."







Maths Enrichment Program

This year saw the establishment of the Accelerated Mathematics Program (AMPED). Students in Year 7 and 8 have taken on the Accelerated Maths program, and have been averaging above 80% in mainstream Maths studies and are now completing a course that is up to 12 months ahead of mainstream Maths!

Students in Years 7 to 10 took part in an engaging and thought-provoking workshop on Bijections, conducted by University of Melbourne School of Mathematics and Statistics.

They encountered apparently random problems and explored connections between these problems. The Mathematics underlying these problems has rich applications both in theory and practice, particularly in the space of computing. Our participants were enthusiastic, dedicated and enjoyed a valuable and memorable experience.

Our students took part in The Bebras Challenge throughout the year. Unsurprisingly, our students did very well, with many receiving High Distinctions and Distinctions for their efforts.

Religious Education





Teaching Reflection

Our students have engaged in our Religion curriculum with energy, enthusiasm and a desire to broaden their knowledge. Across the year, we've explored Identity and Belonging, what it means to be Lasallian, Caring for Creation and the nature and beauty of having a vibrant Prayer Life. An inquiry approach to learning has helped to build connections between faith and life, placing student lives and questions at the centre. This has enabled students to engage in ways that are meaningful to them and their own experience.

Our Year 7s explored the history of St Bede's College and the significance of a Lasallian school. They considered what faith, service and community look like for them in their world. They expanded their knowledge of the Bible and discussed how it can be used for guidance today. There was much enjoyment in examining and debating ethical dilemmas, where they were challenged to apply Christian teachings and values to tricky contemporary scenarios.

Our Year 8s examined the story of Jesus, The Early Christians and Saint Paul as a Christian Hero. Pope Francis' life and teachings provided a platform for deeper thinking on a personal, local and global level. Students considered the challenges faced by refugees today and what Christians can do to help. This encouraged students to become active contributors to a just and fair society, to build a sense of belonging to humanity and to continue to be responsible and compassionate global citizens. Students investigated issues of injustice in Australia and across the world, and researched religious organisations who try to combat injustice.

Year 9s had the opportunity to discover different elective components of Religion, and its relationship to Art, Food, Media and Sport. This gave students a broader and deeper understanding of how religion and faith are involved in other facets of life, helping them to dive into areas of their interest and live life to the full.

Senior students continued the development of critical thinking on Lasallian core values. Our curriculum enabled

them to make ethical decisions, navigate challenges and develop a strong moral compass to guide them in their lives at St Bede's College and beyond. Retreat programs, seminars and class masses complemented in-class experiences, and allowed students to reflect on key messages from their Catholic and Lasallian teachings.

The Rite Journey

Supporting Respectful, Resilient and Reflective Adults

Year 9 students embarked on our new program 'The Rite Journey.' The program is designed to mark the transition from childhood into adolescence and early adulthood, and to support the development of being self-aware, responsible, respectful, resilient, resourceful and reflective adults.

Many topics were explored including respect for others, our own family dynamics and our responsibilities, the expectations placed upon all of us, future careers and pathways including entering the workforce, and adolescence being a time of change.

Students enjoyed having the space to reflect on their own traditions, and discussing how their families mark and celebrate transitions in life. They explored rites of passage in different cultures, and reflecting on what an ideal rite of passage into adolescence would look like for them. Big Emotions was a topic of great interest, delving into brain development in adolescence and how this can impact emotional regulation. The RE classroom provided a safe space for the students to explore healthy ways of managing big emotions and time to reflect on their own experiences.

The program consisted of activities designed to engage students and to facilitate discussion within a trusting environment around the issues confronting young people. This led to an awareness of the need for ongoing collaboration with parents, teachers or mentors. The notion of each young person needing a trusted mentor was explored with an invitation for each student to work with their parents to choose someone to accompany them on their journey of growth.

The Rite Journey complements our College wellbeing programs to support our students in their development and preparation for transition to their senior years and adulthood.
